Parag D. Parobo is an associate professor of History at the D. D. Kosambi School of Social Sciences and Behavioural Studies, Goa University. He holds a PhD in History from Goa University and his research interests are the comparative history of empires with reference to South Asia, focusing on the cultural history of Portuguese colonialism in India. He is the author of *India's First Democratic Revolution: Dayanand Bandodkar and the Rise of Bahujan in Goa* (Delhi: Orient Blackswan, 2015). He has published most recently in the *Indian Economic and Social History Review, South Asia: Journal of South Asian Studies, Economic and Political Weekly, South Asia Research, Studies in Indian Politics and Journal of Human Values, that grows out of his interest with a postcolonial project of writing history—searching for the voices and agency of the people at the margins of society.*

Vishvesh Prabhakar Kandolkar, PhD, is an Associate Professor at the Goa College of Architecture.
